★ DBEs Are Critical to Nevada's Economy

Across the country, more than **50,000 DBE-certified small businesses** employ over **500,000 people**, many of whom live in the communities where these businesses operate. In Nevada alone:

- **1,121 DBE-certified businesses** currently operate and compete for contracts.
- These firms create an estimated **11,210 good-paying jobs** in their communities.

DBEs are often **trusted, local specialty contractors**, providing stable jobs for working families and reinvesting in the places they call home. In rural areas, DBEs are frequently among the **largest local employers**.

★ The DBE Program Works—For Nevada and the Nation

The DBE program levels the playing field in a historically exclusionary industry. It ensures that:

- **Qualified women-owned businesses** have access to contract opportunities.
- **Taxpayer dollars stay local**—supporting small, independent businesses instead of being siphoned off by larger, out-of-state firms.
- Local contractors who live with the infrastructure they build have a **vested interest in getting the job done right**.

These businesses undergo rigorous certification to qualify as DBEs, and they are ready to deliver.

★ The Stakes Are High: What Happens Without Reauthorization

Without reauthorization, the DBE program—and the local jobs and businesses it supports—will be at serious risk.

- Many small businesses could lose access to critical infrastructure contracts.
- Communities across Nevada could face **layoffs, reduced wages, and business closures**.
- America's infrastructure sector would suffer from **reduced competition and innovation**, with large firms dominating contract awards.
